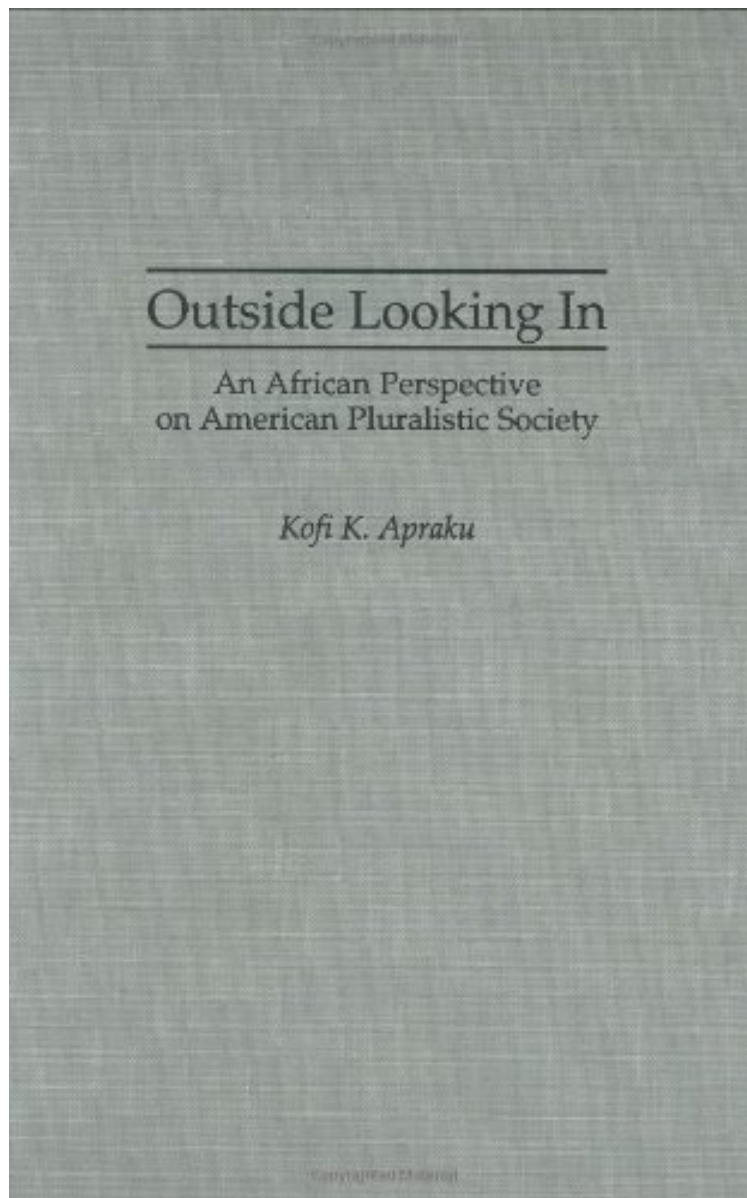


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Outside Looking In: An African Perspective on American Pluralistic Society (New Europe: Interdisciplinary)
